Be Prepared!

In my sermon on Sunday, Aug. 18, I shared that earlier in the week, my car battery had decided to quit on me – and that I had been very pleased with my past self for having the foresight to charge my portable jump starter I'm fortunate that I was sufficiently able to use it for its intended purpose, and to have the time to go and get the battery replaced.

The moral of my story is, unsurprisingly, that one should "Be prepared!" We never know what the future will bring. While this is the same logic that my mom uses for refusing to throw out her spices from the 1970s ("You never know when a recipe will call for caraway seeds!", that's not exactly the kind of "preparation" that I mean. I mean to instruct us to be prepared in more important ways: having a flashlight handy in case of a power outage; saving money for our taxes each month; decluttering from our homes any unused or unnecessary items; talking with family about our (and their own) plans in the event of death; making sure our records, bank documents, and online passwords can be easily located by family members in case of an emergency in which we are incapacitated. These kinds of preparations are easy to make at any age, and they can also make a big difference!

Paul's first letter to the Thessalonian church urges them to the same kind of urgency in preparation. At the time when he wrote it, Paul and the early Christians in Thessalonica believed that Jesus would be returning imminently and immediately – and that it could happen at any time. The end and resurrection of all things were on the forefront of their minds – not way in the back, like they are for us today, as we've lived so many more centuries of waiting for Jesus than they did. Paul told them:

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. (NRSV: 1 Thess. 5:1-2)



We know today that the Thessalonian church was almost too prepared! Many Christians there were quitting their jobs, selling all their possessions, and leaving themselves without resources as they waited for Jesus. In the minds of those folks, Jesus could come that very afternoon! And if they weren't prepared, then they wouldn't be ready to meet him. The second letter that Paul and his disciples wrote to the Thessalonian church addressed those folks who had basically decided to live in a bunker until the return of Christ. He said to them:

> For we hear that some of you are living irresponsibly, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right. (NRSV: 2 Thess. 1:11-13)

In our preparation for any possible event, we can become just as overwhelmed and frightened as those members of the Thessalonian church. We can over-prepare – and that's almost as unhelpful as being underprepared! Paul is saying in these two letters that as we remember the instruction of Jesus, we should be mindful to focus not on the end times, but on living as Jesus taught us to live now. We should work hard for the Kingdom; we should not be so focused on what comes next that we neglect our responsibilities in this life. This is great advice for all of us.
